**Call to Order:** Dr. Dorsey called the meeting to order at 9:00 am.

**I. Approval of Meeting Minutes – November 6, 2025**

- A motion to approve minutes was put forth by Sabrina Tyuse and second by Scott Sell. All in attendance approved.

**II. Academic Programs:**

- Majors –
  - Chaifetz School of Business
    - Business Administration, B.S. (CIM 834) – The Chaifetz School of Business (CSB) is proposing to transition back to a BSBA major and closing all the independent BS majors listed below. The closed majors would be reinstated as concentrations. The purpose of this proposal is to ensure that CSB students take 75% of their new concentration coursework at SLU. The proposal lists the advantages of this transition as Alignment with Prestigious Peer Institutions; Marketing Advantages in Outreach to Prospective students; Greater Clarity and flexibility; Compliance with Graduation Requirements; and Streamlined program assessment and Accreditation reporting. The university catalog will reflect the changes. The website will need a better search engine to find the concentrations when searching for the majors.
    - Concerns from Enrollment Management were voiced by Stephanie Dugo: The market analysis projects an enrollment drop if CSB closes majors and opens as

concentrations. Debbie Pike voiced concern that the data and market analysis are incorrect.

- Marissa Cope reported that accreditation and CBK are unchanged. CSB has committed to doing an internal assessment of the concentrations focusing on an alternating schedule.
  - CAS would like to revisit the issue of resources in relation to the Core courses and the burden of delivering those courses to meet the needs of the Business School students.
  - Advising voiced that these are difficult conversations for advisors.
  - Sophia Lee (representing the CSB student group) said the students have concern regarding the ability to connect with future employers and fear the loss of their major identity.
  - Dimitra Manos – will Madrid be affected. They will follow the same structure as STL campus.

The proposed CS + X programs listed below are designed to prepare students for careers that mix computer programming and art for an interdisciplinary experience adding 18 hours of coursework and an integrated capstone. There are flexible entry points for students at different levels. SSE collaborated with all departments involved and has received a letter of agreement from each. CAS voiced concern for Psychology and Neuroscience as they are currently very tight. Scott Sell indicated that in the short term he sees no need for additional resources. SSE also acknowledged a capacity at large issue on the Madrid campus and is pausing on Madrid campus.

- ABM
  - School of Science and Engineering: This ABM expansion creates a pathway for Madrid students to transition from a BS to a Computer Science MS accelerated option enhancing access and opportunities for international students. Increasing faculty collaboration in research and infrastructure development.

  - School of Social Work: The three proposals of accelerated bachelors to graduate degrees offer students an opportunity to begin their master coursework in their senior year. Fifteen graduate credits may count toward their UG and GR degrees. The committee voiced concern that the proposal does not define “qualified” students and does not designate a GPA requirement (overall GPA/major GPA). Also suggested that some language be added that “there are no substitutions for Core requirements”.

    - Bachelor’s to Criminology and Criminal Justice, M.A. Accelerated Program (CIM 831).
