



## Missouri Voters' Opinions on Income, Property, and Other Tax Policy

The following document summarizes the opinions of likely voters in Missouri on issues related to grocery taxes, property taxes, tax credits for childcare, and education-related tax policy. These results are from SLU/YouGov Polls conducted from June 2020 to February 2026.

### Key Missouri Findings

- 52% of Missouri voters prefer that the Missouri state government rely on sales taxes more than individual income taxes to raise revenue. 29% prefer income taxes to sales taxes (Feb. 2026 Poll)
- 52% of Missouri voters support eliminating the state income tax (Feb. 2025 Poll)
- 81% of Missouri voters support eliminating the state sales tax on groceries ([Feb. 2024 Poll](#))
- 81% of Missouri voters agree that property taxes should not be raised for Missouri homeowners who are 62 years old or older ([Feb. 2024 Poll](#))
